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Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress of the 7th July 1838 entitled "An act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows of the State of New York"

Wagon County On this twenty seventh day of October one thousand eight hundred and thirty eight Personally appeared before me ~~Thomas Pappan~~ son of the Judge in and for the said County of Wagon Margaret Parmenter a resident of the Town of Mounds in the County aforesaid aged Twenty five years who being first duly sworn according to Law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 7th 1838 entitled "An act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows" That she is the widow of Benjamin Parmenter who was a Pensioner under the act of Congress (the benefits) of 1818 - She further declares that she was married to the said Benjamin Parmenter on the 28th day of October 1784 that her husband the aforesaid Benjamin Parmenter died on the 11th day of May 1832 and that she drew his arriage of Pension after his death that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage took place previous to the first of January sixteen hundred and twenty four namely at the time aforesaid sworn to and subscribed on the day And has above written

This may certify that I have been examined with the said Margaret Parmenter and she is a widow of ten years and is aged 34 years and is not infirmly she is wholly unable to stand court Daniel Pappan

Justices of the Peace of Albany and Judge of the Mayor's Court -
of New-York, personally appears *Benjamin Palmiston* aged

thirty years, resident in *Montgomery Co.* in the said State who being
by his first duty sworn, according to law, doth on his oath, make the following declaration, in or-
der to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for cer-
tain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war:"

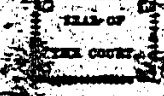
That he the said *Benjamin Palmiston* enlisted in *Dutchess County* in the state
of *New York* in the company commanded by Captain *Joseph Hunter*
Col. John Wainwright's Regiment of the *New York Line*; that he continued to
serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States until the *month of September*
1777 - when he was discharged from service in *Stillwater* state of
New York - that he was in the battles of *Taking Montreal* under
Genl. Montgomery also at *Three Rivers* and *in several important battles*
under the command of Genl. Burgoyne - *that he enlisted as above within*
the month of September 1778 - *that he had a written discharge but lost*
and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for sup-
port; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

I, *Philip S. Parker* Judge, &c. as aforesaid, do certify, that it appears
to my satisfaction, that the said *Benjamin Palmiston* did serve in the
revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy; and I now
transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Depart-
ment of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress.

And further
from the deposition of Benjamin Palmiston himself and
also from the view of the said Benjamin Palmiston now before
me I am satisfied that the said Benjamin is in reduced
circumstances and stands in need of assistance
from his country for support.

personally appeared before the *County* court for said county of *Rutland* in open court, (said court being a court of record, agreeably to the laws of this state, having the power of fine and imprisonment, &c.) *Benjamin Barnes* aged *65* years, resident in *Fairhaven* in said county of *Rutland* who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth,

on his oath declare, that he served in the revolutionary war, as follows: *for 13 months, from the 1st of Dec. 1775. to the 1st of Sept 1777 in Capt. Joshua Skuntor & Col. Warner Regt.*

that he made his original declaration on the *15th* day of *June* 1818 has received a Pension Certificate, No. *5192* And I do solemnly swear, that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary War," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818;—and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contain-

ed in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed. *a small quantity of 100* *permanents* *Shrewsbury* *from the town of Wells in* *the state of New York and family in* *Shrewsbury* *to Fairhaven in Vermont land & water, my family* *consists of myself 64 yrs* *also state my wife* *Elizabeth aged 55 yrs* *daughter named* *Ann aged 17 yrs* *a son named John aged 14 yrs*
