On this *Tenth* day of *June* 1818, before me the subscriber, *one of the*
Recorder of Albany and Judge of the Mayor's Court which is a Court of Record
 State of New-York, personally appears *John Palmerton* — aged
sixty two — years, resident in *Saratoga County* in the said *State* who being
 by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in or-
 der to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for cer-
 tain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war:"
 That he the said *John Palmerton* enlisted in *Dutchess County* in the state
 of *New York* — in the company commanded by Captain *Josiah Stanton*
Col. Seth Warner's Regiment of the New York Line; that he continued to
 serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States until the *month of November*
1777 when he was discharged from service in *Stillwater* state of
New York —, that he was in the battles of *the taking of Montreal under*
Gen: Montgomery, also at Three Rivers, and in several engagements at
the taking of Gen: Burgoyne's — That he *lost* in the *month of September*
1775 *that he has a written discharge which is casually lost*
 and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for sup-
 port; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

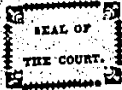

 ment of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress.

Montgomery being duly sworn saith that John Palmeton who had subscribed the foregoing declaration is the brother of this deponent. That the facts stated by the said John in his declaration are true. That the said John this deponent and another brother named Amosiah enlisted at the same time belonged to the same company and Regiment and was discharged at the same time to wit in November after Genl. Burgoyne's surrender. That the fall of the year of 1776 another brother named Amosiah enlisted and was wounded in the battle at Stillwater and died of his wounds. And further that the said John Palmeton has a large family to support that he is in poor & destitute circumstances and actually stands in need of assistance for his country for support and further saith not.

ON this Twentieth day of August 1820 personally appeared in open Court, in the Court of Common Pleas of the said County, the same being a Court of Record for the said County, proceeding according to the course of the common law with a jurisdiction unlimited in point of amount, keeping a record of its proceedings and having the power of fine and imprisonment,

John Palmerton of the Town of Halfmoon in the County of Saratoga

aged Sixty six years, resident in the said County, in the State aforesaid, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follows:

That he enlisted himself a soldier in the Revolutionary war in the Year 1776 in Captain Joshua Stanton's Company, in Col. Seth Warner's Regiment, and served in General Montgomery's Army, and was at Luckee with G. Montgomery, and served for the full term of fourteen months, and then discharged from the Army

That his original declaration was made on or about the fourth day of June 1818 and that his Pension Certificate is numbered 15193

AND I solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof, with intent thereby so to diminish it, as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States, in the Revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day of March, 1818; and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property or securities, contracts or debts, due to me; nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed, and by me subscribed.

Personal property one feather bed, and bed long, two small chairs, one chest, one oil dining table, three oak chairs, and one small one horse sleigh, some small iron tools, one iron tea kettle and one skillet two common trunks paid - Family consists of myself, my wife aged about forty and two years old, very weakly, and unable to labor for a living, two daughters aged about 15 years old, the other about 9 years old, as to myself being old, and infirm & unable to labor for a living and must live without help. Old last May, that she resides in Auteable
in said County. that she is sister to
Elizabeth Palmerton widow of John
Palmerton, and as she has been informed and
believes, now resides in the Town of Collins
in this State, that she well recollects the
the time her sister was married to the
said John Palmerton, but as the deponent
was not at home at the time, she was
not present at the marriage. that the
marriage must have taken place as early
as the fall of the year 1776 for she well
recollects that she was in Eastown about
50 miles from home that she was informed
of the marriage by ^{a neighbor} the said John Palmerton,
that some months afterwards she returned
home to Darily in the State of Vermont, and knows
that their first child was born the next
fall or winter afterwards. that the Deponent
nursed her sister at the birth of her first
child - It was reported and generally believed
that at the time the said John Palmerton
was married he was a Soldier - The said
John and Elizabeth lived together, had a
large family of children, and sustained the relation
of husband and wife, and the Deponent never
heard any report against the legality of their
marriage, and she therefore believes they
were legally married, as above stated -

Sister from report. From the knowledge
he has of the ages of the family and from
all the circumstances relating to the
family, he has no doubt but his
Parents were married at the time
and place stated by his Mother.

one of her Sons — — Joshua J. Palmerton

Town of Collins in the County of Eric & State of
New York, aged Eighty seven years this present
Month, who being first duly affirmed according
to law, doth on her affirmation make the following
declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
the provision made by the act of Congress passed
July 4th 1836, and of the Act of June 7, 1838,
That she is the Widow of John Palmerton who
was a Soldier in the Revolutionary War, and
was a pensioner of the United States at the
time of his death, that he enlisted in the
Summer or fall of the year 1775 and was
under Arnold at the Siege of Quebec, that
he was in the Service in the year 1776 and
was in the battle at Hubbardton Vermont
previous to the Surrender of General Burgoyne
in 1777. She cannot state the periods of the
enlistment or Services of her said Husband
or the Names of his Officers, but knows of his
absence and that it was then reported that
he was in the Service, which she believes
to be true - She further declares that she was
married to the said John Palmerton on the
4th day of December One thousand seven
hundred seventy six (1776) in Clarndon in
the County of Rutland State of Vermont, at
the House of Captain Patter, at the same
time Job Conger was also married to one
of Captain Patters daughters, they were all
married by a Minister whose name is not
remembered, that at the time of their
marriage her Husband was a Soldier and
was at home on furlow, that her Husband
the aforesaid John Palmerton died in the

Month of July 1824 in the County of Saratoga
in this State, as she has been informed and
believes, and that she has remained a widow
ever since that period, as will more fully
appear by the reference to the proof hereto
annexed —

to law on his oath, that he is the son of John &
Elizabeth Palmerton, and for and on behalf of his
Mother Elizabeth Palmerton makes the following
Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of
the provision made by the Act of Congress passed
July 4th 1836 & of July 4th 1848, that she the said
Elizabeth Palmerton is the Widow of John Palmerton
deceased, who was a Revolutionary Soldier and
a pensioner of the United States when he died
in the County of Saratoga in the year 1824
that she is Ninety years of Age and that her
mental faculties have become so much impaired
by the infirmities of Age she is wholly incompetent
or incapacitated from making this declara-
tion or to transact any business whatever &
that she resides with the deponent in the
said town of Collins. The deponent further
declares that his Parents were married in the
year 1776 previous to ^{the expiration of} his service, as he has been
informed & from the Ages of the Children and other
information, believes that they were so married,
that the said Elizabeth Palmerton is now
a widow and has not been married since
the death of her said Husband, that she is
now a Revolutionary pensioner of the United
States under the Act of Congress of the 4th
of July 1836 at the rate of Twenty six dollars
and Sixty six cents per Annum, and this

declaration is made in order to obtain an increase
of the pension for the full amount allowed her
by the laws of Congress.
